Content

• Produce original poetry, fiction, nonfiction and/or drama that demonstrate the conventions of professional creative writing, an awareness of literary and aesthetic traditions, and complex thought and inquiry.

• Analyze the aesthetic components, conventions, structure, range, history, and forms of poetry, fiction, nonfiction, and/or drama.

Communication

• Express content clearly and fluently in creative works by demonstrating command of the structure, syntax, diction, and lyricism of language.

Integrity/Values

- Demonstrate adherence to discipline-specific professional and academic standards, including style and attribution conventions (MLA or Chicago).
- Demonstrate critical and artistic consciousness of underrepresented experiences and cultures (both local and global) through writing.

Assessment of Student Learning Outcomes

We are committed to providing learning opportunities of the highest possible quality. Our internationally recognized faculty members will assess students' progress in a number of ways including the following: formal essays, extensively researched bibliographies, group projects, examinations, in-class presentations, at least one presentation that has been proposed by the student and presented before a scholarly audience, and a 25-30 page thesis that is potentially publishable. Before graduation students will be asked to complete an Exit Survey in which they assess their own intellectual growth and professional development. In return we expect students' attendance, preparedness, and active participation in coursework and projects.
