What's in your toolbox?

Often, one of the biggest hurdles to overcome when undertaking a new project is compiling the tools needed to actually get started. I certainly see this often as faculty consider if/how to begin work on a new proposal for external funding. Getting started requires several tools: a great idea (and evidence of the idea's success); an aligned funding program; time to think, plan, and write; and support from the University.

Faculty, particularly those who have not yet navigated the process to pursue and secure external funding, may be overwhelmed by the prospect of even getting started on this process; however, many UWF faculty already have a valuable tool available to them: a project funded by a UWF award.

If you've secured UWF support for your High-Impact Practice, Office of Undergraduate Research project, or a college-funded project, you may have valuable pilot project information to support a more extensive proposal. Additionally, you already prepared a (successful) proposal for that internal funding. These are invaluable tools for constructing a concept paper or drafting a proposal for an external funding program.

RAE is considering hosting a multi-day working session in May to help UWF faculty move from an internally funded project to a proposal for expanded external support. The Pilot-to-Proposal Workshop will occur across multiple days after Spring 2023 grade submission and will include both informational sessions from UWF and external experts, as well as dedicated time for researching and writing that next step document.
