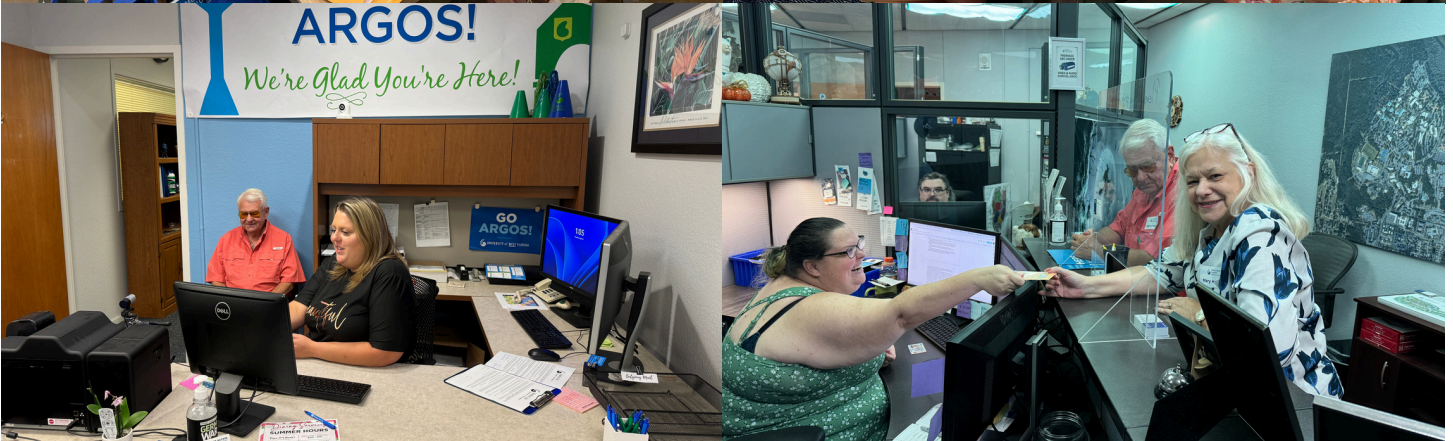

MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

Meet Bill Healey!



I retired from the University of West Florida in 2019 after 47 years of service, most recently as Executive Director of Student Life, overseeing Recreation, Athletics, and Student Activities.

My journey with UWF began in 1972 as Assistant Dean of Student Affairs, where I was responsible for Intramural Sports. Over time, we expanded to include the Leisure Class series, Sports Clubs, Aquatics, Fitness, and Outdoor Adventures. Before joining UWF, I earned a Bachelor of Science from the University of Central Missouri and a Master of Science from the University of Illinois, which laid the foundation for my career in student affairs and recreation.

As many of you know, at UWF, everything happens by committee! I was fortunate to serve on several building committees that

shaped the campus, including the Aquatic Center, the East Sports Complex (Baseball, Softball, Soccer, and Track), the expansion of the Field House, and the Tennis Complex. My final projects included the Health, Leisure, and Sports facility and the Argonaut Athletic Club. I also approved the development of mountain bike trails on the west campus with one of our alumni groups, the Pensacola Off Road Cyclists (PORC) and even physically cut the running trails on the east campus—trails I now enjoy walking with my dog Birdie!

It was a pleasure to serve in leadership positions for Recreation & Wellness, Athletics and Student Activities which positioned me nicely to serve other associations as well. UWF gave me the opportunity to serve twice on the Board of Directors of NIRSA (National Intramural Recreational Sports Association) as well as its foundation board. I also served as President of the Pensacola Sports Association (now Pensacola Sports) in 2009. Even in retirement I continue to serve on various University and community committees including the REA Board of Directors.

While I take great pride in the physical growth and development of UWF's recreational spaces, what I'm most proud of from my time at the university is the commitment to student development. When I started in recreation in 1972, it was me and four student staff members. By the time I retired, we had grown to 10 full-time employees, 10 graduate assistants, and 266 student employees. In 1995, we launched an effort to recognize Outstanding Rec Sports Alumni who have achieved significant success after graduation.

Since then, we've honored one alum each year and our recipients have truly built up quite the resumes! We have had two UWF Board of Trustee members, four who served on national board of directors, eight doctoral graduates, four presidents of national associations, 14 Directors of Recreation or Athletics, six who own their own business, and 1 Olympic coach!

To further support student success, the William M. Healey Award was established to provide financial assistance to undergraduate students who demonstrate a strong commitment to the mission, vision, and values of Recreation and Wellness. To date, 27 recipients have earned the Healey Leadership Award scholarship.

And on a personal note, I couldn't be prouder that both of my daughters, Rachel and Mary, are UWF graduates.

UWF has been a community for me and my family for over 50 years and I am grateful for the opportunities it has provided. I encourage you to join the Retired Employees Association for service, fellowship, and adventures with those who developed our fine intuition of higher learning. 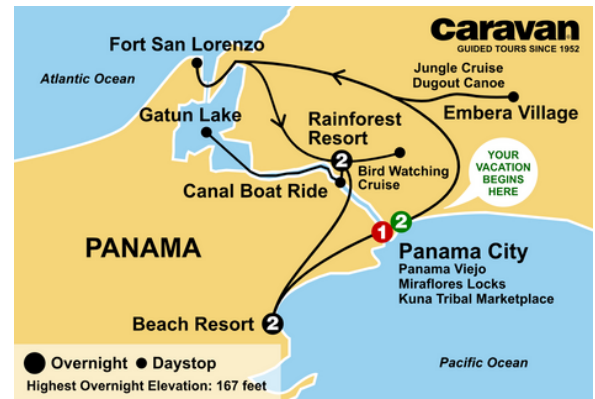

UWF REA TRIP TO PANAMA

An Exploration of the Panama Canal and Beyond by Jim and Judy Weaver and Copliot

DAY 1: THE TRIP BEGINS

On January 20th, just before a snowstorm of the century hit Pensacola, Jacqui and Bob Berger and Jim and Judy Weaver embarked on an exciting journey to Panama and the Panama Canal. We arrived in Panama City about 3 PM and were amazed at the size of the city with a population of about 1 million people. It is a huge city with what seemed like hundreds of skyscrapers. Our adventure began with a meeting with our tour director on the evening of our arrival, setting the stage for a memorable trip.



DAY 2: EXPLORING OLD PANAMA AND THE MIRAFLORES LOCKS

Our first full day in Panama was packed with exciting sights and experiences. We embarked on a Caravan bus tour that took us through the historic streets of old Panama. The city, with its rich history and vibrant culture, was a sight to behold, offering a glimpse into its storied past. We marveled at the architectural remnants and the lively atmosphere of the old quarter.

The highlight of the day was our visit to the Miraflores locks, a crucial part of the Panama Canal. The locks are an engineering marvel, allowing ships to traverse the canal by lifting and lowering them to different water levels. As we stood by the locks, we were fortunate to witness a large cargo ship making its way through. The villagers shared their rich cultural heritage with us, showcasing their traditional dances and crafts. We were honored to join them for lunch, savoring the local flavors and enjoying the warm hospitality. The experience was further enriched by the opportunity to dance with the villagers, creating cherished memories of our time in the village.

In the afternoon, we visited Fort San Lorenzo, a historic fortification that stands as a testament to Panama's colonial past. The fort, perched on a cliff overlooking the Caribbean Sea, offered stunning views and a glimpse into the strategic importance of the region. We explored the ancient walls and learned about the fort's role in defending the area from pirates and invaders.

DAY 4: BIRD WATCHING AND WILDLIFE ENCOUNTERS

Our third day in Panama began with an early morning bird-watching excursion on the Chagres River. As dawn broke, we set out on a boat, gliding along the river's calm waters. The rainforest came alive with the sounds of chirping birds and rustling leaves. Our guide pointed out various bird species, some of which were endemic to the region. The sight of colorful plumage and the melodic calls of the birds made for an enchanting experience.



Later in the day, we visited a sloth rescue center and a butterfly garden. The sloth rescue center was a heartwarming experience, as we learned about the efforts to rehabilitate and protect these gentle creatures. We observed the sloths up close, marveling at their slow and deliberate movements. The butterfly garden was equally captivating, with vibrant butterflies flitting about in a kaleidoscope of colors.

DAY 5: SCENIC BOAT RIDE AND CANAL EXPLORATION

On the fourth day, we embarked on a boat ride through the most scenic portion of the Panama Canal. The canal, an engineering wonder, stretches through the heart of Panama, connecting the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans. As we cruised along, we encountered monkeys living on the protected islands within the canal. The sight of these playful creatures added a touch of excitement to the journey. One of them actually jumped on and off our boat.

We also witnessed massive cargo ships navigating the canal's artificially created Gatun Lake. The sheer size of these vessels, coupled with the intricate logistics of their passage through the canal, was a remarkable sight. We observed the huge dredging equipment at work, ensuring the waterways remained open and operational. Our journey continued as we crossed the Centennial Bridge and gazed over the Panama Canal's Gaillard Cut, a significant section of the canal that cuts through the Continental Divide.

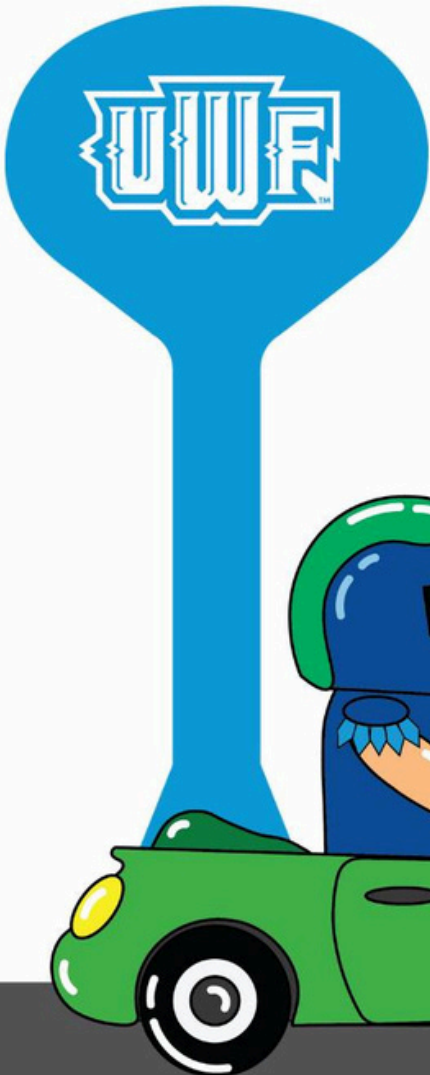

UWF Parking Services News



UWF Parking and Transportation Services is moving to a License Plate Recognition and Virtual Permit System. With the new system, your license plate serves as your permit. You will no longer need to use the hangtag you were provided when you retired. The information attached to your current permit will be captured in the system so there is no action needed on the part of current retirees.

Folks who retire after the system goes into effect or who did not obtain a Retired Employee hangtag will simply stop by Parking Services in Building 20W, Room 151, and provide their vehicle information.

Beginning October 1, 2025 you can discontinue using your existing Retired Employee hangtags. Please note that you will no longer be permitted to back into parking spaces.
